

# THERAPY BUNNIES BRING COMFORT

Meet Karlee Brewer and Buster. Each day across 28 counties in North and South Carolina, Hospice & Palliative Care Charlotte Region (HPCCR) cares for those facing serious illness or nearing death. Part of the HPCCR mission is to help the bereaved heal after the loss of a loved one. Karlee is one of those tender souls. We'll get to Buster in a minute.

Karlee lost her dad, Samuel, in a motorcycle accident last July. Samuel and Karlee were best friends. Until she was 3½, the only place she'd sleep was in his arms. "Samuel had her spoiled rotten from the day she was born," says Sha Brewer, her mom.

Losing her father at the young age of seven left Karlee defiant. She struggled to process her feelings. Enter HPCCR Grief Counselor, Missy Francis, and Buster, the Dutch bunny. Determined to comfort this freckle-faced little girl, Missy turned to a unique ministry that uses the most tender living things to soothe our hurts, therapy bunnies.

"He calms me down," Karlee says. "I get happy."


Buster and his therapy bunny friends belong to Brittany Bryson. Brittany founded "Bunny Blessings" as a non-profit ministry to comfort folks in nursing homes, homeless shelters, and the like. Her bunnies come in all shapes, sizes, and colors. Most had been abandoned.

Buster and Company started out in her home, then moved to the garage, and finally to a bunny barn the family built on their five-acre spread in Belmont. With COVID-19 preventing Brittany from bringing the bunnies to people in need, the people in need are coming to the barn. That includes Karlee and her mom, and hopefully other members of the HPCCR family. "Our mission is to love one another," Brittany says. "These bunnies bring so much joy. They're small, they're quiet, and they're not aggressive. Bunnies are super soft."

The therapy bunnies are developing a following. Some nurses in Australia saw them on Facebook and messaged their support. The bunnies even have their own website – www.bunnyblessings. com – with pictures and bios. Along with many other entertaining stories, it says right there that Karlee's friend, Buster, spills his water bowl all day long.

HPCCR's Missy Francis, whose mission is to heal the hurts, says the bunnies were guests at an Employees Therapy Day in Lincolnton, but it's watching Karlee and Buster at the barn that leaves her nearly speechless. "It's Karlee's own special sanctuary," Missy says, unable to finish the thought. "I'm crying. I'm sorry." Magical time with soft bunnies is just one of many ways the HPCCR team finds to bring comfort and joy to those who grieve.





# A LOVE FOREVER STRONG

Roz and Tommy held hands as Chaplain Jonathan used a slightly updated version of their original wedding vows from ten years prior - connecting past and present with their strong bond of love.

Hospice and palliative care is more than just treating pain and symptoms for a patient. We provide a holistic form of care that treats the *whole person* and the emotional, spiritual, and physical aspects of their lives. We also know that life does not end with a diagnosis or even hospice care...there is life left to live and moments to celebrate. Playing a small part in making celebrations possible is something we are grateful for each and every day - because every life matters. And we can help families create positive memories to carry them through the end-of-life journey and beyond.

So, when Hospice & Palliative Care Charlotte Region (HPCCR) Chaplain Jonathan Allen learned that a very special patient, Roselynn (Roz) Skidmore, and her loving husband, Tommy, had a 10-year wedding anniversary coming up, he jumped at the chance to make that momentous milestone a memorable occasion!

When Roz received her ALS diagnosis in 2016, she was in her early fifties. As she describes it, she was "at the height of her life." She was physically fit, active in her church, enjoyed her career, and loved spending time with her family. Her son, Jesse, two-year-old granddaughter, Hadley, and new grandson, Hendrix, are the lights of her life.

Tommy, though, is her soulmate. When you meet them, you know this is a love like no other. Tommy adores Roz; you can see it in every move he makes. He tells us that

he, "knew the minute they met he was going to marry Roz." And they did just that on January 18, 2011 when they married in Punta Cana, Dominican Republic, on a gorgeous tropical beach with Jesse, her son, and Kelsey, Tommy's beautiful daughter, as their witnesses.

In 2014, Roz and Tommy had just returned from an action-packed trip to Costa Rica where they swam with sharks, rappelled down a waterfall, and ziplined through the jungle. They were so enamored with the beautiful country of Costa Rica that they planned on spending part of their retirement years there.

But shortly after their return, Roz began to feel that something wasn't right. Her normal daily activities became harder. After two years of tests, doctor visits, and progressing symptoms, she learned she had ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease) - a progressive neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord.

When you get to know Roz, you learn that she has a history of taking the most challenging of situations and turning them into an immense source of strength. True to form, she did that with her ALS diagnosis.

She found the positive in this new challenge and made it her faith-based mission to raise awareness and spread hope and happiness wherever she could.



From raising over \$12k in her first walk in support of ALS to raising another \$15k in her second and so many other incredible achievements - she's a beacon of light through the hope and joy she shares with the world. And those who have had the pleasure of meeting her, even for a moment, know that's just who she is - in her heart and soul.

Getting to know Roz and Tommy Skidmore has been an incredible inspiration and pleasure. When they asked Chaplain Jonathan if he could perform a vow renewal ceremony, it was an opportunity he could not miss!

"I feel blessed to participate in this very poignant and meaningful ceremony," Chaplain Jonathan expresses.

Though COVID and other unforeseen circumstances tried to dampen the spirit of the occasion, the Skidmore's love and excitement in celebrating their vow renewal was too strong to let obstacles get in the way.

As the date approached, Roz's condition began to decline, leading to an adjustment to their ceremony. The plan for Roz in a wheelchair by Tommy's side in a larger ceremony in their spacious living room was no longer possible, and they made the difficult decision to have her stay in bed. Due to COVID space restrictions, this limited the attendance to a maximum of four, but this would not keep them from having a very special and intimate ceremony.

As Roz has described after being told three times in the past four years that she only has months to live, she "chooses to believe Christ is in charge of that decision, not man."

So when the day of the ceremony arrived, she was ready. The beautiful couple dressed in white – just like their wedding day. In place of tropical flowers, were delicate



pink roses. And a lovely bouquet of 10 balloons – one for each year of their marriage – added a very special and meaningful touch.

Roz's father arrived early with flowers and a precious kiss on the cheek. Due to his own health concerns he reluctantly, but lovingly, departed prior to the other guests arriving.

In a small, intimate ceremony, Roz and Tommy held hands as Chaplain Jonathan used a slightly updated version of their original wedding vows - connecting past and present - with their strong bond of love - a love forever strong.

We would like to wish the Skidmores a very happy 10th wedding anniversary. Your story, and your love for one another, inspire us.

## YES, SOUP FOR YOU!

## Soup on Sunday is always the last Sunday in January.

For over two decades, Hospice & Palliative Care Charlotte Region's (HPCCR's) annual "Soup on Sunday" fundraiser has been a much-anticipated community gathering event as winter temperatures create a chill in the air. In a "typical year," 800 - 1000 attendees fill the Philip L. Van Every Culinary Arts Building at Central Piedmont Community College, under a banner of friendship and community, to sample amazing soups prepared with winter soup-lovers in mind. As COVID-19 numbers climbed following the holidays, the question became: how do you safely serve delicious soups from local chefs during a pandemic? Curbside delivery service with a smile, of course.

Taking a page from Chick-fil-A's playbook, HPCCR volunteers and staff delivered hundreds of quarts of pre-ordered soup and safely engaged with donors and supporters, all through the passenger side window of a car. What proved remarkable about this year's event was that despite all the obstacles and pressing

hardships faced by Charlotte's culinary community, 20 restaurants (including culinary schools and caterers) chose to participate this year, collectively donating 140 gallons of soups, stews, and bisques. Special commemorative soup bowls were available again this year for purchase, to enjoy soup all year long.

Proceeds from "Soup on Sunday" are used to fund four critical aspects of HPCCR's mission. Through this event and other gifts from the community, HPCCR ensures access to compassionate and high-quality care for all (regardless of ability to pay), leverages innovation to drive support of patients, provides critical resources to families and caregivers along their journey, and supports area healthcare initiatives by measurably lowering rehospitalizations.

Hospice & Palliative Care Charlotte Region (HPCCR) is committed to providing exceptional end-of-life care beyond the Charlotte area. As part of that pledge, we are expanding access through a partnership with our neighbor to the west, Hospice Cleveland County (HCC). This combination of two hospices with stellar reputations will create an opportunity to leverage the talents of our staffs to broaden our reach, respond to care needs, and stay ahead of health care changes.

Both organizations are not-for-profits who have strong community ties and provide access to uninsured and underinsured patients and families through generous donations. The two respected leaders have a combined 50 plus years of experience in the hospice industry. The collective organization will now serve over 2,600 patients daily across 28 counties in North and South Carolina at six hospice houses, or in homes, hospitals, and other inpatient facilities.

HPCCR President & CEO Peter Brunnick states, "We are gaining a highly regarded partner in Hospice Cleveland County and increasing our ability to serve all who are in need. This opportunity further enables us to provide a seamless continuum of care across a broad geographic region."

With constant evolution in healthcare policy, Medicare reimbursement, and delivery, Brunnick said the combined resources of the two hospice providers will help the organization stay ahead of change, remain competitive, and respond to patient and family care needs. HPCCR and HCC have collaborated frequently over the years, and both

achieve superior rankings on the federal government's Hospice Compare quality measures of hospice providers nationally.

The combination with HCC brings two more hospice houses into the fold: Wendover Hospice House in Shelby and Testa Family Hospice House in Kings Mountain. Both organizations use a holistic hospice approach with collaborative teams of care providers for patients and families.

"This is great news for Cleveland County and the Charlotte region as we combine two community-based, not-for-profit hospice providers committed to delivering the best possible care for patients – regardless of their ability to pay or the complexity of their illnesses," says Myra McGinnis, who will continue as president of Hospice Cleveland County. "Unlike the for-profit providers that are increasingly entering this region, our organizations have been here for decades, so we know our communities, our patients and our healthcare providers – and we put their interests first."

For over 36 years, Hospice Cleveland County has served thousands of patients and their families in Cleveland, Gaston, and Rutherford counties. ## Dr. William "Bill" Williams, Jr.

Dr. Williams, a valued former physician at HPCCR, passed away in March at age 73. One of his most important contributions was leading our Kids Path pediatric specialty care program where he helped our young patients, and their families, with compassion and through his invaluable expertise.

Dr. Williams completed residencies at UVA Medical Center and Charlotte Memorial Hospital in Pediatrics and Internal Medicine. Children and families were dear to his heart, demonstrated by his founding of the Davidson Clinic in 1978 where he cared for countless families. He also served as Chief Medical Officer of Carolinas Medical Center (now Atrium). While presiding as Chair of the National Board of Medical Examiners, he influenced medical professionals all over the world.

Dr. Williams was devoted to his community, profession, patients, and public health. He positively influenced many people during his tenure here from mentoring staff to caring for young people and their families. We feel fortunate to have been a part of his life and will continue to miss him dearly.
